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Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ at BRF,

Grace and peace be with all. "How is it with your soul these days?" This is a question that John Wesley who was a founder of Methodism encouraged Christians to ask of one another. In our world today, it can be easy to neglect our souls, because we have become so focused on our family, our job, our finances, or any number of other things, not to mention the Covid-19. Even when we have a free moment, we can find ourselves so tired that we just binge watch something, anything really, trying to catch a few moments of rest in the midst of life's many challenges. Meanwhile, our souls can get neglected.

What are you doing to care for your soul? Is your soul nourished? Are you going through the darkest valley of death? Are you experiencing the dark night of the soul?

In his book in 2004, The Dark Night of the Soul, Gerald G. May said, we "don't know the difference between good things and bad things," and "they have been given to me in the course of life." We can't count them separately. They are interwoven in our life. So we are "not as much in control of life as we would like to be." The dark night of the soul can happen to everyone and such an experience teaches us significant lessons. He writes, "It is a deep transformation, a movement toward indescribable freedom and joy and is an ongoing spiritual process in which we are liberated from attachments and compulsions and empowered to live and love more freely."

The dark night of the soul "gives deep meaning to life but the meaning is beyond our comprehension." "But it is true that the meaning is there, that life is much more than coping and adjustment ... there is something wonderful at the heart of our existence, and it is about nothing other than love: love for God, love for one another, love for creation, love for life itself." Our life has meaning in every moment and the meaning is just love. Our life is nothing less than a journey looking for love. No words needed anymore. Everything in our life is for that journey. Somebody looks for something meaningful from worldly things, and those things can become their attachment or addiction. Others look for something from God such as be faith, hope, and love.

May succinctly summarizes the purpose of our human beings that "All human beings are created in and from the love of God, with an inborn love for God that continually arises from God and constantly seeks God. This love is meant to flow for all people and all creation. This is our true human nature." Love is the sole purpose of all creation including us as human beings.

Let us again look at the Gospel of Luke 10:25-28: "On one occasion an expert in the law stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he asked, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" "What is written in the Law?" he replied. "How do you read it?" He answered, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind' and, 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' "You have answered correctly," Jesus replied. "Do this and you will live."

Loving God and loving others are not separated. Both are more nourished through worship, prayers, reading

Class 201: Discovering My Spiritual Maturity.

Life wasn't meant to be lived standing still. We should always be moving, learning, and growing as people and as followers of Jesus. But it can be easy to get stuck in a rut. It's not that you're unwilling to grow — maybe you just aren't sure where to start or what to do next. But it could be as simple as establishing a few key habits in your life to get you on the right track. Here's what you can expect:

- * Slow down the busyness of your schedule by learning how to develop a daily time with God.
- * Stop feeling like you're alone in your problems by finding the right small group
- * Let go of materialism by learning how to give to God first

Class 201 is designed to teach you about these simple habits and show you the different steps you can take to mature and grow as a Christian. *This class will begin October 9th for 3 weeks*,

surprising. While It showed that only 21% of people attend church, 80% of people were spiritual and longed to connect or reconnect a relationship with Jesus Christ. Why the disparity?

The responses they heard were similar to what we hear in the United States: sporting events on Sundays, parents working on weekends or using Sunday as their only day off to rest and catch up. To many, the traditional church style and hymnody feel foreign and do not appeal. Many have been alienated, disrespected, ostracized by previous church experience.

Out of that research the *Fresh Expressions*, movement was created. This is a form of church for our changing culture, established primarily for the benefit of those who are not yet members of any church. It will come into being through principles of listening, service, contextual mission and making disciples; to meet people where they are rather than dragging them, begging them, to come to us. People are met on their own turf, in their own interest groups, and on the mission field.

If you are intrigued in the concept or want to develop and share a strong, Spirit-led relationship with God, you are invited to "*Water into Wine Sundays*" on the Porch with prayer, study, and sharing. 
Black River Falls United Methodist Church SEPTEMBER Mission Outreach Committee report

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Gregory the Great September 3



None of us are all good, and few of us are all bad. We often struggle with decisions, sometimes finding our well-intentioned efforts producing unfortunate results. Thus with Gregory. Born in Rome about 500 years after Christ, his family provided wealth and rank, and he became mayor of Rome at age 33. After his father's death, Gregory gave his inheritance to the church and the poor, turned his mansion into a monastery, and became a monk.

He was consecrated as Pope Gregory I on **September 3, 590**, and did much good. He had been burdened for the evangelization of England since seeing blond, blue-eyed British boys being sold in the Roman slave markets. "They are Anglos," he reportedly said. "Let them become angels." He sent Augustin to evangelize the British Isles.

Gregory also appointed wise and competent men as church leaders, and he fought apostasy. He encouraged the Visigoths to turn from heresy to orthodox doctrine. He wrote evangelistic tracts to barbarian tribes, and upheld biblical morality. He prepared a training manual for clergy. He wrote liturgy and popularized the Gregorian chant.

But Gregory also established the dogmas of purgatory and the Mass. He encouraged the worship of relics (the remains of deceased Christians), and popularized unlikely legends about the saints. He glorified the past and held tradition equal with Scripture. He drew wild, allegorical lessons from the pages of the Bible. And he claimed universal jurisdiction over Christendom.

With Western Europe in chaos and the Roman Empire shattered, Gregory assumed broad civil control. He ruled most of Italy. He raised an army and defeated the Lombards. He negotiated treaties to avoid Rome's destruction. He ransomed captured individuals. He collected taxes and supplied food and services to the poor. He, in effect, turned the church into the state.

In so doing, Gregory became the father of the medieval papacy—with all the good and bad that *that* entailed.

Jesus answered, "My kingdom doesn't belong to this world.... I was born into this world to tell about the truth. And everyone who belongs to the truth knows my voice." John 18:36,37b
