Dear Beloved,

Wow! What a social upheaval in a month. Who would have thought a month ago that we would not be having regular worship services and that we would be "hunkered down" trying to avoid the coronavirus? Life does throw us some crazy curves. The challenge is "What are we going to do in the meantime?"

As your pastor, your spiritual mentor, I would ask you to stay focused on the fact that we are in the Lenten season. In last month's letter I had included the following paragraph:

"This season of Lent is a time to slow down, to breathe deep and to humble ourselves before the Lord. I think King David said it the best in Psalm 51:16-17, "You do not delight in sacrifice, or I would bring it; you do not take pleasure in burnt offerings. The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart, O God, you will not despise."

We are definitely forced to "slow down, to breathe deep and to humble ourselves before the Lord." In the craziness that we are in, many people are getting stressed out and living in fear. What about you? Where are you spiritually? Are you resting in the Lord or is your spirit in a panic?

My suggestion would be for you to take time to get into the Psalms for there is great comfort there. Maybe read the Gospel of John and refresh/renew your relationship with Jesus. We might not have a chance to gather during Holy Week or to celebrate Easter but we can stay grounded in the living Word.

At this time, plans are in the works to broadcast live Sunday services (without congregational presence) on radio and to do Facebook live so that we may worship together in spirit if not in body. May the peace of Christ sustain you and may the love of Christ fill you as we face this uncertain future together. And, when we look at our present reality and our uncertain future remember that they all are a blink of an eye as compared to an eternity of dwelling in God's Kingdom which is a present reality and a future hope.




- ♦ No Sunday School Easter Sunday, April 12

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE

A number of the projects that were included in the Capital Campaign have already been completed and we are already enjoying the benefits of these upgrades: new entrance doors with handicap features, new blacktop parking lot, microphone and technology upgrades, and eaves troughs.

Progress is continuing on other projects that were included in the campaign. Sampson Heating and Air Conditioning from Hixton has been working to replace the furnaces and air conditioning units with new units that have a higher efficiency rating and will use less energy. They will soon start work to replace the wiring and electrical panels that control the boilers.

Five dying trees have been removed from the church yard by Prairie View Ranch LLC. They will return when the snow is gone, grind the stumps, fill in with black dirt, and seed down the areas.

Flooring is one project that is yet to be done. With the uncertain times we are going through right now, we are holding off on starting this project. Hopefully we will be able to start replacing the carpets sometime this summer.

A Word from Bishop Jung About the Coronavirus Pandemic

And after he had dismissed the crowds, he went up the mountain by himself to pray.

When evening came, he was there alone. Matthew 14:23

My beloved family in Christ across Wisconsin, know that I am praying for you. We are going through an extraordinary time. It is a time of anxiety and worry, a time of fear and uncertainty, and a time of testing for our faith. But our God is good, our God is with us, and our God loves us.

In the best of times, we are stronger together. It is right and good that we worship together that we pray together, study together, work together, and minister together. But there are times such as these where we are most faithful when we care for each other from a distance. Following the example of Jesus, this Lenten time may be one where we must withdraw and be by ourselves more. We are in a time when it is inadvisable to gether together for worship. In fact, we are strongly suggesting that we refrain from publicly open worship services minimally until April 5, Palm Sunday. It may mean we need to suspend worship this year through Easter. While this is difficult and painful, it is also a glorious opportunity to show our creativity and commitment. The White House, the Center for Disease Control, our state government and health care officials are asking that we not gather in groups larger than ten members for at least the next two weeks. Some reports are saying we shouldn't gather in groups of 50 or more for at least eight weeks. Regardless the parameters of the advice, we are in a time of necessary voluntary separation and face-to-face isolation.

But this in no way means we cannot be in ministry with each other. We are blessed with phones, email, computers, tablets, and multiple technologies to allow communication across distance. We can form prayer chains. We can create online devotion and worship circles. We can keep in contact with the most vulnerable in our faith communities and develop healthy and faithful ways to meet their needs and offer them care. We can join streaming worship services broadcast without congregations physically present, and we can engage in family devotions and worship. This is indeed a challenging time, but God is with us right where w are. Thisd is a critical time for us to care as much about as many as we possibly can! We are in ministry through our prayers, our phone calls, our emails, and our video chats. Congregational leaders can still connect for ministry meetings in a variety of ways. It is too easy to be swept away by all we cannot do; let us make a faith commitment to focus on what we CAN do. Please continue to support the ministry of your congregation in whatever possible ways you can.

The Wisconsin Conference is cancelling or postponing all in person meetings, gatherings, and events for a minimum of the next four weeks. We will announce further cancellations and postponements, if needed. We will regularly post updates and resources on our website to help local congregations navigate this difficult time, and to support you in your ministry. Conference and district staff can help you set up Zoom video meetings if that would be helpful. We will do all in our power to help you do effective ministry in the weeks to come.

I want you all to know how much I appreciate your leadership and your faithfulness in this pandemic time. It is scary, especially for the most vulnerable among us. There are no clear or easy answers. We do not know how long we must take exceptional precautions. We do not know when the dangers will pass. What we do know is that we have God, we have each other, and we have a faith that will keep us strong through even the greatest challenges.


