

Our church has committed to being a part of this by donating 20 pillows, blankets and sheet sets and volunteering our time and talents on the build day. A sign up sheet for volunteers will be placed in the gathering area beginning this month and donations of bedding (twin size) will be accepted. Donations can be brought to the church.

We will have a **Sewing Day** on **April 4**, **from 1-4** to finish 1 quilts to donate as well. We will be hand tying off the quilt so many hands are needed. You do not need a sewing machine to participate. Please let me know you are able to participate in this sewing day. Call 715 896 9055.

Our pillowcase dresses were well received and appreciated. Unfortunately as Marcia was not able to hand deliver them but relied on a trusted contact. Thanks to everyone that participated with their time or donations to make the pillow case dresses to send with her. Marcia reported that they were able to meet the health and vision needs of many.

We are making great progress toward our goal for the Knit for Kids project. We have 99 items so far toward our goal of 100. Our final date to turn in completed projects will be April 30 with preparations for a blessing and then send off to World Vision in early May. Yarn donations are always greatly appreciated as some of us work on projects throughout the year. Pastor would also like to have some prayer shawls available to give to individuals or families. Patterns are available in the Wesley room with the other patterns if you need it

As part of our church's outreach, Pastor Shon visits shut-ins in their homes or in residential centers. In addition he also shares responsibility with other pastors to lead a service at Pine View Nursing Home every 3 months. We are considering creating a prayer card or some small item that could be left with people during these visits. Our committee has reached out to the Women of Faith group for some assistance with this project.

What Happened on This Day in the History of Christianity?

Another Brilliant Bishop April 4



Isidore was born about 560 in Seville, Spain, into a noble Christian family. He was the youngest child and was personally educated by his mucholder brother, Leander, the close friend of Pope Gregory the Great. Though severe in his methods, Leander managed to furnish his little brother with both a brilliant mind and a tender heart.

When Isidore became pastor in Seville he concerned himself with establishing schools for the young, converting false teachers to orthodoxy, and evangelizing Jews. He established seminaries in every Spanish diocese for training young ministers.

But he did more. He compiled history's first encyclopedia, the *Etymologiae*. It became the most used textbook of the Middle Ages, containing entries on medicine, arithmetic, grammar, history, science, and theology. Isidore also developed a dictionary of synonyms, a book on astronomy, a summary of world history, a set of biographies of illustrious men, books on biblical characters, and many books of sermons and theological studies. He became known as the greatest teacher in Spain.

The highlight of his career came late in his 37-year ministry. He presided over the great Spanish church council of Toledo which opened on December 5, 633. At this council, it was determined that baptismal candidates should be plunged into water only once, not three times. The council also approved the singing of hymns, not just the words of Scripture. And it forbade the compulsory conversion of Jews.

Two years later when he sensed he was dying, Isidore began distributing his goods to the poor. Four days before his death he asked two friends to carry him to the church of St. Vincent the Martyr. Once there he had one of them cover him with sackcloth and the other put ashes on his head. The old scholar then raised his hands to heaven and prayed loudly, confessing his sins and pleading for grace. A crowd assembled, and Isidore requested their prayers and forgave his debtors. He preached to the people about love, then distributed his remaining possessions. Returning home, he took to his bed and died peacefully on Thursday, **April 4, 636**.

UWF had a discussion at our March monthly meeting on **Interrupting the School-to-Prison Pipeline**, one campaign theme for UWF local units to learn more about. The facts focused on the high percent of children and youth of color who face criminalization or incarceration follow-

ing suspensions and expulsions from school for minor offenses, racial and gender biases, zero tolerance policies, and status offenses of which youth are often criminalized for. Supporting our youth through their opportunities and challenges can often help prevent youth from getting caught up in negative situations.

To become more informed on how faith and the community can impact those incarcerated, **Chaplain Myron Olson from Jackson Correctional Institute** will speak on **Monday, April 3 at 6:15pm in the Fellowship Hall**. He will speak on his faith journey and how his journey led him to JCI. He will share more background on his work with the JCI population and the impact of the surrounding community. UWF will be hosting a potluck to be served from 5:30-6pm. All church members, men, women, and youth, are invited to join us for the evening.

You will see that we have had less income for 2023 than expenses. We have expenses in the winter that we do not have for 7 to 8 months per year. This will balance out as we go through 2023.

We are still working out the "details" with our new Accounting Firm Dobson Accounting. We are processing the change from Church Windows to Quicken. Both platforms are similar but we are getting used to the way the numbers come to us. By the end of March, we will have a better handle on both our income and expenses, as we understand the Quicken Balance Sheets. Dobson Accounting is doing an excellent job for us.

As we continue to move forward through 2023, we expect that income will balance out expenses.

At the heart of any successful church relaunch is discernment and prayer. One very effective method is a neighborhood prayer walk.


As the weather turns warmer, I encourage you to meet at the

What is the meaning within the remarkable scene in Luke 4:1–14 of

Jesus being challenged by the devil in the "wild"—the untamed and

He faces three tests, or "temptations"— all aimed at unseating him from his identity, his belovedness, and his purpose as the Son of God.

Time for a ReLaunch



John Wesley, founder of the Methodist Church, utilized Christ's example, and thousands were introduced to a different life through Christ. Wesley's ministry was radical in his time, and far from the way that the church had always worked in the past. He recognized the need to change methods to reach more people.

Today, how does the church re-invent itself for the future? On February 24th/25th Reverend Scott Carlson, Director of Congregational Development lead a workshop for the 19 in attendance presenting insights and instruction. 80% or more of our community is unchurched. Most people think the Christian church no longer cares about them and has become irrelevant in their lives. We were encouraged to seek opportunities to meet people in the immediate neighborhoods outside our church building and to develop new relationships and introduce our new friends to a relationship with Christ.

Examples of this type of ministry include sponsoring a "Splash" event and then inviting guests to follow-up events. Rather than Vacation Bible School in the church building with kids from other churches, taking VBS to an apartment complex, meeting unchurched children and parents on their turf, and listening to needs, then having follow-up opportunities to continue conversations. One such follow -up was a series of mother's nights out. 15 of 20 mothers and their children joined the church.

Once relationships are made, invitations to explore faith development within our church are more welcome. The ideas keep rolling – from selling egg rolls at the fair, handing out hotdogs on our church property, and offering community musical events. We realized how much we do with food could reveal our slogan, "Feeding People" quickly emerged as a possible brand for our new ministries. Look for more information over the next two months through newsletter, worship, and phone calls.

What is Holy Week?

Is your Easter all about eggs and bunnies and dressing up nice for church? What about the deeper

meaning of the celebration? Try adding one or more (or all) of these Holy Week activities to make

your Easter celebration more meaningful and fully experience the joy of the hallelujahs on Easter Sunday.

Holy Week is the week leading up to Easter. It begins with Palm Sunday and is a week of somber reflections on the events leading up to Easter.

Palm Sunday is the celebration of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem. This is the Sunday prior to Easter and is often celebrated by waving palm branches, reenacting the parade with Jesus riding into Jerusalem on a donkey.

Maundy Thursday (or Holy Thursday) commemorates the Last Supper. Many Mandy Thursday services include foot washing and stripping of the altar – removing all signs of Jesus from the church for observing the days Jesus was dead.

Good Friday observes the day Jesus was crucified. This day is often observed with praying stations of the cross. It's the most solemn day of the church year.

Holy Saturday reflects the day Jesus was buried in the tomb.

The week concludes with **EASTER**, a celebration of Jesus' resurrection.

You are invited to a Scripture and Prayer Plan for Holy Week.

Palm Sunday: Read and pray through Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem (<u>Mark 11:1-11</u>)

Monday: Begin reading the account of Jesus' final week in John. Today, read and pray through Jesus' anointing at Bethany, when Mary pours perfume on his head (John 12:1-11)

Tuesday: Read and pray through Jesus' prediction of his death (John 12:20-36)

Wednesday: Read and pray through Jesus' prediction of his betrayal (John 13:21-30)

Thursday: Read and pray through the Last Supper (John 13:1-17, 31-35) and Jesus' prayer in the Garden of Gethsemane (Matthew 26:36-45)

Friday: Read and pray through Jesus' arrest and crucifixion (John 18:28-19:37)

Saturday: Read and pray through the burial of Jesus (Matthew 27:57-66)

Sunday: Read and pray through the resurrection of Jesus (John 20:1-18)
