Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ at BRFUMC,

Peace and grace be with you all. We have entered into Lent, a season of 40 days of spiritual renewal. I want to reflect on the meaning of this Lenten time with you so that we all could appreciate Jesus' sacrificial love for us. But, first, let's back up a bit and talk about the Super Bowl.

I would guess most of you enjoyed the Super Bowl, known as the world's largest single-sporting event, that took place last Sunday, Feb. 19. The game ended with the Kansas City Chiefs defeating the Philadelphia Eagles to lift the 57th Super Bowl trophy. I heard this Super Bowl marked a few historic records. First, this Super Bowl was the first one with a black quarterback matchup. Second, the star of this year's Super Bowl halftime show was pop star Rihanna. Third, the pilots who flew the jets during the Super Bowl celebration were all women commemorating the 50th anniversary of the U.S. Navy allowing women to fly planes.

Among these stories, the one that caught my attention was the story of 94-year-old George Toma. For 57 years, since the first Super Bowl, his job has been to care for the turf in the stadium. George Toma is known as the "Sodfather" or "the God of Sod." People call him the Groundskeeper. As the Groundskeeper he manages the stadium. Eighteen months ago, George started sowing and tending the grass to ensure the game was played in the best conditions for Super Bowl Sunday. Two weeks before the game, he laid the grass on the field, adjusted the temperature to make sure it was well-rooted, and provided adequate water and sunlight. George said he has fulfilled his mission as a manager and that he was retiring from his position as turf "keeper" for the last time. Toma was honored by the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2001 as the recipient of the Ralph Hay Pioneer Award and also he was inducted into the Major League Baseball Groundskeepers Hall of Fame on January 8, 2012, as one of its charter members.

When I heard the term keeper, the idea that there are multiple managers in the world such as gatekeepers, beekeepers, shopkeepers, housekeepers, occurred to me. It seems that much of what people do in the world is the job of managers, that is, stewards. To be a Christian is to be a manager or steward of the world in which God allows us to live. In addition, we, as stewards of God, should take care of some values that the world usually ignore, such as "love, grace, faith, hope, joy, gratitude, patience, self-control, faithfulness, the gospel, and the mysteries of God."

Sometimes God entrusts us with things that are more important than even these things. It is suffering. When God entrusts suffering to anyone, He does not entrust it to just anyone. He entrusts it to the most trustworthy, to those who can bear the suffering. The people of faith in the Bible were so called "the bearers of suffering", who all bore their sufferings on account of Jesus Christ. Paul says, "Now I rejoice in what I am suffering for you, and I fill up in my flesh what is still lacking in regard to Christ's afflictions, for the sake of his body, which is the church" (Colossians 1:24).

We are called by God to deny ourselves and take up our cross and follow Jesus who went through the Way of suffering, *Via Dolorosa* for us. When we finish our course of this world well as God intended us to do, God will reward us and give us "*life as our victor's crown*," "*Well done, good and faithful servant!*" (*Matthew 25:23 and Revelation 2:10*).

I invite you to reflect on our faith journey again in this Lent season. Are you willing to bear the suffering for God and the church? What suffering are you bearing for the sake of God and the church? May God bless you that you could walk in the journey of suffering with the Holy Spirit.

The mission outreach committee had a very productive meeting in February. We made plans for our participation in **the Sleep in Heavenly Peace (SHP) bed build**. This will be held on April 22 at Jackson Electric. Please mark your calendars. Marcia has been in contact with the coordinator and we will join other area churches and community volunteers to build 100 beds that day. Our church has committed to being a part of this by donating 20 pillows, blankets and sheet sets and volunteering our time and talents on the build day. A sign up sheet for volunteers will be placed in the gathering area beginning this month and donations of bedding (twin size) will be accepted. Donations can be brought to the church. We will have a sewing day on March 8 from 1-4 to try to assemble 1 or 2 quilts to donate as well. Donations of fabric and batting will be needed. Please let me know you are able to participate in this sewing day. Call 715 896 9055.

Thanks to everyone that participated with their time or donations to make **the pillow case dresses** to send with Marcia Hagen. We surpassed our goal of 25 by 3, sending 28 dresses with her. If you enjoy this project, "kits" are available in the gathering area to work on at your leisure in preparation for the next mission trip. I will have a summary report of Marcia's experience in our April newsletter.

We are making great progress toward our goal for **the Knit for Kids project**. We have 70 items so far toward our goal of 100. Please keep those donations of yard coming in. Pastor would also like to have some prayer shawls available to give to individuals or families. Patterns are available in the Wesley room with the other patterns if you need it.

As part of our church's outreach, Pastor Shon visits shut-ins in their homes or in residential centers. In addition he also shares responsibility with other pastors to lead a service at Pine View Nursing Home every 3 months. We are considering creating a prayer card or some small item that could be left with people during these visits. If you have some ideas or thoughts about this please let us know.

For our **Christmas project** we collected 162 varied items to be used as bingo prizes. These items were split between Pine View Nursing Home and Meadowbrook. In addition we collected 82 pounds of grocery items that were donated to the Food Shelf. Thanks to everyone that participated. We have received thank you notes expressing their appreciation. You make a difference in others lives.

We have set up a separate bulletin board in the gathering area highlighting volunteer opportunities through our **United Methodist Church Volunteers in Mission (VIM)** if you would like to serve outside of the local community. All contact information is there so be sure to check this out. Remember there are some scholarship monies available to you if needed.

What Happened on This Day in the History of Christianity?

A Practical Examination

March 4

The sailing of the mission ship *Duff* was an event to remember.

Thirty missionaries and their families set out from England to the South Pacific in August 1796. The morning was foggy, but the crowds were celebrative, singing hymns and offering prayers. The ship crossed the horizon and seven months later, on Saturday, March 4, 1797, the missionaries landed safely on Tahiti. The next day they held a worship service, then set to work.

The *Duff*'s captain, a Christian, was entrusted with the responsibility of seeing the missionaries established on various islands in the region. After several weeks on Tahiti, he felt secure enough to leave some of the workers there and take others to neighboring islands. He planted ten missionaries on Tonga, then proceeded to the islands of the Marquises to deposit two men, **William Crook** (1775-1846, England) and **John Harris** (1754-1819, England).

But an unexpected problem arose, one that their theological and missions training had not equipped the preachers to handle. No sooner had the ship anchored than beautiful naked native women swam out to welcome the missionaries. Crook and Harris nervously bundled their things and went ashore.

Such curious crowds met the two that Crook became separated from Harris and found himself alone with the chief's wife. To his horror, she immediately began seeking his attentions. When he refused, she seemed bewildered. As it turned out, she wondered if he was, in fact, a *man*. Resolving to find out, she and a mob of other women attacked Harris during the night and conducted a "**practical examination**" to clear up the matter.

The *Duff*'s crew found Harris sitting on the beach the next morning, suffering from shock, humiliated, and very anxious to leave. The work in the Marquises was abandoned. The work on Tonga proceeded with difficulty. The Tahiti mission showed more promise and eventually led to many conversions.

Joseph was well-built and handsome, and Potiphar's wife soon noticed him. One day, Joseph went to Potiphar's house to do his work, and none of the other servants were there. Potiphar's wife grabbed hold of his coat and said, "Make love to me!" Joseph ran out of the house, leaving her hanging onto his coat. Genesis 39:6b-7a, 11–12

Expected Income: \$275,950.00 Expected Expenses: \$272,709.50

You may or may not know we have hired Dobson Accounting to handle our accounting for our church. They will handle the general accounting as well as handle payroll for staff. We hope we can simplify the accounting and help clarify the month to month "numbers". At the time of this update, we are still looking to hire an Administrative Assistant to help with day to day office needs. This position will be a 20 hour per week paid position.

We continue to ask that you reaffirm your commitment to our United Methodist Church by your attendance at church worship and continue to volunteer your time and talents. Your gifts to our church can make sure sure we can meet expenses.

In the April newsletter, we will have a more detailed breakdown of income and expenses. I will also detail a few areas where we have found we can cut expenses while still meeting the needs of our church.

Time for a ReLaunch

The Christian Church has been in decline for 2 decades, made worse by secu lar views of the church and Covid-19 Pandemic. How, as a church, do we reinvent ourselves for the future?

Reverend Scott Carlson, Director of Congregational Development lead a workshop this past weekend presenting insights and instruction. 80% of our community is unchurched. Most people do not think the Christian church cares and has become irrelevant. The answer is as simple as creating opportunities to meet people outside our church building, developing new relationships and introducing our new friends to a relationship with Christ by sharing our own stories.

This follows Christ's example, one that John Wesley, founder of the Methodist Church utilized when thousands were introduced to a different life through Christ. Many examples of this process from growing churches were shared: Starting with a "Splash" event and then having predetermined follow-up events. Rather than Vacation Bible School in the church building with kids from other churches, taking VBS to an apartment complex, meeting unchurched children and parents on their turf, and listening to needs, then having follow-up opportunities to continue conversations. One such follow-up was a series of mother's nights out. In one circumstance 15 out of 20 ended up joining the church.

Focusing on what we already do well, we springboarded off the upcoming Men's Group St. Patrick's Day Corned beef and Cabbage Dinner – Calling that our "Splash event". Ideas included tickets to be raffled on WWIS radio, invitation to our nearby neighbors to offer food and conversation, marketing on Main Street and more. Invitations for upcoming Wednesday Connections would then be given to encourage people to follow-up events.

Once relationships made, invitations to explore faith development within our church community are done. From that, the ideas kept rolling. Look for more information over the next two months through newsletter, worship, and phone calls.

Part of Starting a ReLaunch is <u>Discernment and Prayer</u>. Reverend Scott Carlson encouraged developing prayer teams and opportunities for prayer and discernment of what direction God wants our church to go. One very fruitful method is a <u>Neighborhood Prayer Walk</u>.

Starting Sunday, March 19, we will start at the church at 11:30 am and walk and pray for the neighborhood immediately surrounding the church for 30-60 minutes. All interested are encouraged to participate and see what answers the Lord brings.
