FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ Jesus at BRF,

Peace and grace be with you. I hope you are enjoying the warm weather this spring.

As you might know, we Christians are the people of Easter. Easter is a significant event to believers in Jesus' days and to us today because it changed everything. He was acknowledged by people as a glutton and a drunkard, a friend of sinners and tax collectors (Matthew 11:19). He indeed became a friend of sinners and ate with the marginalized and minority. Once prejudice is deeply entrenched in our mind, it is hard to break. Prejudice is often used to refer to a preconceived (usually unfavorable) evaluation or classification of another person based on that person's perceived personal characteristics. People tend not to change their mind unless they encounter the ultimate power like Jesus Christ.

Actually, Jesus came to us to break stereotypes and prejudice in our heart and mind. He met shunned people, such as a Samaritan woman, a tax collector, and even a member of the assembly in the ancient Land of Israel unconditionally in grace and love, regardless of family background, appearance, race, education, etc. Above all, Jesus shattered the belief that death is the end by His resurrection from the grave.

One day in 1874, Pastor Robert Lowry was reading the story of Jesus' resurrection recorded in Luke 24. The angel said to the women who had visited Jesus' tomb. "Why seek the living among the dead, for he is not here, but he is risen. He is not here, but he is risen." When he read the phrase, Pastor Lowry's body soared like a spring. Then, he ran to the organ and expressed his excitement that Jesus had been resurrected in a hymn, which is "Up from the Grave He Arose" #322 in the United Methodist Hymnal.

At the beautiful Easter musical which celebrated Jesus' resurrection last Easter Sunday, we rejoiced that Jesus arose from death. He defeated the power of darkness. He revealed the hope that we are living for in this world that a new life, a new humanity begins from those who believe in Him. It is the Christian life that we have received a new and eternal life through the risen Lord and live by faith waiting for Jesus to come "again," which is the kingdom of God.

"We should no longer be slaves to sin. Our old self was crucified with Jesus. Just as we have been united with Him in a death like His, we will certainly also be united with Him in a resurrection like His" (Romans 6:5-6).

I encourage all of you to live the resurrection life beyond the darkness and despair. "We were called to be free and serve one another humbly in love." (Galatians 5:13).






What Happened on This Day in the History of Christianity?

Weak Lungs

May 4



Inheriting his dad's love for literature, Robertson began a weekly column for the Aberdeen *Journal*. He started pastoring, but doctors told him his lungs were too weak for preaching. He contracted typhoid and pleurisy, resigned his church, and retreated to his books. Here Robertson found his calling.

He was already editing a magazine called *The Expositor*, and in 1886 he began *The British Weekly*. It became a leading Christian journal in Britain. He then started *The Bookman*, and two years later *The Woman at Home* appeared in magazine stalls. While editing his four periodicals, Robertson began publishing books (he read two books a day throughout his life).

The Expositor's Bible, a series of 50 volumes, was released between 1888 and 1905. Then The Expositor's Greek New Testament appeared. Robertson persuaded Alexander Maclaren to issue his expositions; then he found and developed other writers. In all, Robertson edited hundreds of titles and wrote 40 books of his own. He became the most prolific and respected Christian journalist in the English-speaking world.

In 1909, while being knighted, he said, "I never contemplated a literary career. I had expected to go on as a minister, doing literary work in leisure times, but my fate was sealed for me." His illness forced him to do much of his work propped in bed amid the clutter of newspapers, books, pipes, and cigarette ashes. His cats purred nearby, and he always kept a fire burning, claiming that fresh air was the devil's invention. His library contained 25,000 volumes, including 5,000 biographies. "I have read every biography I could lay my hands on," he said, "and not one has failed to teach me something."

Sir W. Robertson Nicoll died on **May 4, 1923**. Among his last words were, "I believe everything I have written about immortality!"

"Rain and snow fall from the sky. But they don't return without watering the earth that produces seeds to plant and grain to eat. That's how it is with my words. They don't return to me without doing everything I send them to do." Isaiah 55:10-11

From your BRF UMC Finance Committee:

This May 2023 Update will give you the status of Church finances through the first three months of 2023

We started out the year with a balance in our general fund account of.....\$22,687.63

We have had income over the first 3 months of......\$78,670.28

We have had expenses over the first 3 months of......\$68,650.49

Balance in our general fund account as of 03/31/2023 was.......\$32,707.42

We are maintaining expenses versus income for the first three months of 2023 as you can see We still have a segregated "Building Fund" Account locally of\$7921.23

We do not use this building found account without request from Trustees. This is an account that we maintain, should a future Capital Project be taken on in the future.

We hold an account at the WI Methodist Foundation. The current balance on that account is \$136,595.78. This was money that we had following the sale of "Our Church Parsonage" some years ago. WI Methodist Foundation invests this money for us. We can only use this money to either buy a new parsonage or assist in paying a housing allowance to our Pastor. We use a small percentage of this money each month to help fund the Housing Allowance we pay to our Pastor.

We did not have a Finance Committee Meeting in April because we have not been getting financial reports by the second Tuesday of the month. When we can establish a timely date to have meetings, we will again be holding regularly scheduled monthly meetings to discuss Church finances.

We ask that you continue your pledges and offerings so we can continue to serve our Church members and our community. Thank you again for all that you do.


