Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ at BRF,

Peace and grace be with you all.

Fall is upon us. It seems as though autumn arrived with a vengeance over a few weeks. The rains poured out unusually more than over the summer, the temperature dropped and leaves now look more red and gold than green. The Autumn equinox has just passed last Saturday, the 23rd. This transition time is a busy season with much to ponder as we navigate the transitions. Farmers are so busy harvesting their crops from the fields where they worked hard and sweated during the seasons of spring and summer.

Just as the field is waiting for workers to harvest, so the world awaits us to save them. It is a time of harvest. In other words, it is a time of spiritual audit. God planted seeds of God's life in my heart and now harvest the crops. "What does it mean for me to grow into the likeness of God?" So when we learn to pray, our faith community will enter into a new and more exciting relationship with God.

When we pray together, we learn how to pray (Acts 2:42, "All the believers devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching, and to fellowship, and to sharing in meals (including the Lord's Supper), and to prayer"), we win the fight (Acts 4:24, 31, "When they heard the report, all the believers lifted their voices together in prayer to God:... 31 After this prayer, the meeting place shook, and they were all filled with the Holy Spirit. Then they preached the word of God with boldness"), and we experience God's presence (Matthew 18:20, "For where two or three gather together as my followers, I am there among them").

I am looking forward to seeing God's miraculous transformation through "Dynamite Prayer". I invite you all to participate in this "Dynamite Prayer Experiment" for 28 days. I am confident that we all see the difference.

What Happened on This Day in the History of Christianity?

Occasionally God answers our prayers before we offer them. William Tyndale put his life at risk when he decided to translate the Bible into the English language during the days of King Henry VIII. The church and government op-



posed him, but he told one clergyman, "If God spare my life, I will cause the boy that driveth the plough to know more of the Scripture than thou dost." On October 6, 1536 he was burned at the stake for his efforts. His last words were, "Lord, open the King of England's eyes."

He perished without knowing the Lord had already answered his prayer—one year earlier, almost to the very day. The answer?



Miles Coverdale. Born in 1488, Coverdale came under the influence of Robert Barnes at Cambridge who discussed ideas "out of Germany" with him. When Coverdale picked up the Bible and began reading it for himself, he fell in love with it. "Now I begyne to taste of Holy Schryptures; now (honour be to God) I am sett to the most swete smell with the godly savour of holy and awncyent Doctoures."

Soon he began preaching an evangelical message. It proved impossible for him in England, so he fled to the Continent where he spent seven years translating the Bible from Latin into English for his own people. It was published in

1535, the first complete edition of the Bible in English. He wisely dedicated it to King Henry VIII, who, being flattered, allowed it to become the first English rendering of Scripture to circulate without official hindrance—thus answering Tyndale's prayer one year in advance.

In his preface Coverdale said he had not coveted the task of translating Scripture, but "it greued (grieved) me yt other nacyons shulde be more plentously prouyded (provided) with ye scripture in theyr mother tongue than we...."

Coverdale became rector of St. Magnus Church near London Bridge, and visitors today can read a memorial plaque on the east wall of the church: ... he spent many years of his life preparing a translation of the Scriptures. On the 4th of October, 1535, the first complete printed English version of the Bible was published under his direction.

Pastoring is Weird

Pastoring is weird. I've poured my heart and soul into people who now act like I don't exist. I've done hours of counseling and deliverance with people who later deleted me. I've publicly honored people who chose to slander me and act like I was a villain. And then there's people I rarely have conversa-

tions with that honor and respect me to the highest degree. Some leaders have washed my feet while others have thrown dirt on my name.

Pastoring is weird. I'm too much for some, yet too little for others. The same preaching that convicts one person angers another. The same sermon that was boring to one was massively impactful to another. Praised for being so loving and graceful, yet slandered for being too loving and graceful in certain situations.

Pastoring is weird. We're accused of just wanting money, yet we're also expected to live in humble poverty like a lowly shepherd. If you have nice things, then you're greedy and materialistic. If you don't have nice things, then you must be in rebellion since God isn't blessing you. People are always asking us for our personal time, money, and resources. Yet when we set healthy boundaries to care for our mental health and our families, we're considered selfish.

Pastoring is weird. Everything you say and do can and will be used against you by anyone disgruntled, annoyed, petty, or even just bored. Every mistake is broadcasted as proof that you're unqualified, yet victories seem less talked about because they're expected. Your personal life, hobbies, interests, friendships, relationships, ministry alignments, and family are under a constant microscope and being monitored by people searching for faults and failures.

Pastoring is weird. You give everything you have and somehow still feel like you didn't give enough. You never meet certain people's expectations. You didn't do enough according to someone's opinion. And there's always someone confident they could do a better job, yet all they do is criticize from the sidelines.

Pastoring is weird. You try your best to protect the sheep from wolves and somehow in the process you end up accused of being a wolf yourself. Sometimes other shepherds who don't even know you spread lies about you and your flock.

Pastoring is weird... and yet there's so much fulfillment in precious moments. The feeling you get when someone gives their life to Christ is beautiful. When you marry a couple who met at your church, bring restoration to a broken family, or dedicate a child that mom and dad prayed hard for makes everything else worth it. When you're asked for by name to be with someone in their last moments. When you're the first person they seek when they need hope. When the healing comes. When the deliverance comes. When the breakthrough comes. When someone who thought they had no purpose gets discipled and preaches their first sermon. When the glory of the Lord fills the

room and the congregation goes wild without restraint in His presence. Nothing

(Ps. Pray for your pastors and leaders! Statistics show that almost 20% of pastors battle depression and 85% of seminary graduates to enter ministry will leave ministry within the first 5 years. Preaching is only part of the job, we are at war behind the scenes, please war for us and with us.)

8 Things I'd Love to Receive for Pastor Appreciation Month

Each year, I post on my personal site a list of possible ways to show your pastor gratitude during October (Pastor Appreciation month). Even with that list in mind, here are some things I would love to receive from members if I were pastoring again:

- **1. Regular, intentional prayer.** In our Church Answers' <u>Know Your Church</u> report, our surveys over the years have indicated that many church members do *not* pray regularly for their pastors. We very much need and appreciate the prayers of God's people, though.
- **2. Sacrificial service.** We call church members to serve God through the church, but it still remains the case that a few people do most of the work. Even one member who was to say to me, "Pastor, I'm stepping up to the plate to serve," would make my day.
- **3. Listening ears.** Here, I'm thinking about the preaching event. I know it's not always easy to pay attention (I struggle with it, too, when I'm listening), but it really is exciting when you sense from the pulpit that members are tuned in to the Word.
- **4. Honest, helpful, face-to-face critique.** My point with this request is simple: I don't mind critique that helps me grow as a preacher and pastor; what I struggle with is critique that is uninformed, unkind, and sometimes unspoken (unspoken to me, that is, but not to others in the church). If you have concerns, give me the gift of speaking the truth in love.
- **5. Global passion.** The Great Commission of Matthew 28:18-20 demands that we make disciples of all the nations, yet 4 billion+ people still have little access to the gospel. Tell me (and show me) that the Lord has grabbed your heart for the nations, though, and I'll rejoice. I want us to send our best to the nations.
- **6. Humble patience.** I'm not perfect—and neither is any other pastor I know. We all make mistakes, and we don't always lead in the best way. To be honest, I still realize the need for more growth even at this stage of my ministry. Your ongoing patience, coupled with loving, godly critique when needed, is encouraging.
- **7. Recorded testimonies.** If you really want to bless me, record in 2-3 minutes the testimony of your conversion and send it to me. I don't want to miss the stories of God's work among the people He has placed in His local body.
- **8. Evangelistic, outwardly-focused fervor.** You may be aware of Church Answers' <u>The Hope Initiative</u>—a simple strategy to turn a church outward a few people at a time. One of my joys is communicating with Hope Initiative pastors overwhelmed by the growing zeal of their members to reach their community. Our hearts leap when God's people get the Great Commission vision.





What Is Breakthrough Prayer?

If you are seeking to follow Christ—like I am—it's crucial to prioritize time for intentional learning from and listening to the voice of God's Spirit for guidance.

If you don't, you and I will only be guessing on our own about the best route to take through each day, and which decisions and choices might accomplish God's purposes in and through you. And likely we will miss living into all the fullness God has for us that is available through the *dunamis*—the resurrection power of God's Spirit--that opens new doors of miraculous possibilities in the potential of any and every moment.

Many faithful Christians do develop the habits of regularly spending time reading the Bible and reflecting on scripture's life applications to live out. And most do ask God through prayer to heal, to comfort, to protect, to provide and to bless loved ones and themselves. However, if you and I long to become part of God's *dunamis* in the world, to live into all the richness of God's intentions for us, we don't want let our prayers stop there!

Everything shifts when we include one more additive component in our recurrent prayer practice through each day. I call it a breakthrough prayer, simply asking for God's new possibilities to break through, inviting God the Almighty to open new doors...and along with it, your commitment that you'll surrender all you are now to make room for all God longs to unfold. Then notice the new eyes and ears of discernment you'll gain as you're truly led forward on the open road of faith. This has changed everything—and I do mean everything! — for me.

Prayer hack...Does the idea of a quick and handy means by which to add such breakthrough prayer to your daily prayer habits appeal to you? Consider an even shorter targeted breakthrough prayer version that I've nicknamed a **prayer-hold**, a prayer style also practiced throughout our historic Christian faith. A prayer-hold is a short phrase or word from a scripture verse you can utilize for frequent prayer use throughout the day. Every hour (or whenever you become aware that you are feeling inadequate, uncertain, or tempted to slide off track spiritually) you can simply pray the day's short prayer-hold. This helps you refocus and realign your spiritual eyes back again on discerning and following the Spirit's activity and guidance.

I'm so passionate about this added dimension of breakthrough prayer that it fueled me to write, along with my friend Rosario Picardo, a 28-day guidebook to help you take the step of a 28-day experiment with this. Discover what the *dunamis*, or dynamite of God's Spirit can break through and open next for you in your adventure of faith!

Marcia Hagen has returned from one mission trip to Guatemala with focus on vision health. She will return again now in October to be part of a team doing cataract surgery. This will be a first for Refuge International and Lions club international. Marcia has been instrumental in her efforts to get this organized. If you are working on pillowcase dresses she may be able to take a few on this second trip. We sent 15 with her on her September trip.

I have been in touch with my lead contact in Lodi that helps move forward the pads that we make for **Patricia Project.** As her group is aging and there is less interest they are going to quit making the pads. Because of this we will have a **final sewing day for Patricia project on November 8 from 10-3 in the Evangelical Lutheran Church basement.** It will be held there as we will be partnering with members from Home and Community Education (HCE) as they celebrate HCE week. This will allow us more room to do our work. The goal is to make as many pads as we can using up all our supplies. This will be our final sewing day for Patricia Project. This October 2023 Update will give you the status of Church finances through the first 9 months of 2023

As of 08/15/2023, our general fund account balance of...... **\$29,376**

We have had income over the first 7 months of \$167,437

We have had expenses over the first 7 months of......\$180,839

We made a payment towards our Conference Apportionments of \$7000 in Sept 23

We have made a total of **\$14,000** in payments for 2023, we want to be sure and make our Conference Apportionments paid by the end of the year (**\$21,042** total)

We are maintaining expenses versus income for the first 8 months of 2023 as you can see

We still have a segregated "Building Fund" Account locally of\$7,971

We do not use this building found account without request from Trustees. This is an account that we maintain, should a future Capital Project be taken on in the future.

We hold an account at the WI Methodist Foundation. The current balance on that account is **\$141,016**. This was money that we had following the sale of "Our Church Parsonage" some years ago. WI Methodist Foundation invests this money for us. We can only use this money to either buy a new parsonage or assist in paying a housing allowance to our Pastor. We use a small percentage of this money each month to help fund the Housing Allowance we pay to our Pastor.

Your support of this church is so valuable in maintaining the ministries of our church.

We ask that you continue your pledges and offerings so we can continue to serve our Church members and our community. We are seeing some pledged amounts for 2023 that have not been submitted yet.

Thank you again for all that you do.

Update from Board of Trustees

The past few months have been focused on looking at upgrading our audio and visual systems. What we have now has been getting us by, but there is a definite need for improvement. We are down to only one projector and who knows how long that one will hold out, sound is not perfect and the equipment is difficult at times to get the results desired.

Dynamic Audio of Black River has met with us and the people who use this equipment to get a feel for what can be done. His original quote was for a complete makeover of new projectors, sound system upgrades, additional camera for better coverage of our Sunday service as well as special events, and new mic's and related equipment for better sound output.

The complete package including installation came in at \$75,915. Dynamic Audio would take care of all warranty issues, and any service work should any problems arise, as well as training our people who will be using the equipment. After a little sticker shock it was agreed at this time to start as basic as we can and hopefully build to a full high quality system when we can.

As we all know money is tight and things like this are always nice to have but difficult to purchase. For now we are focused on the projectors and some sound enhancement. We could still be looking at \$40-45,000. Granted there may be less expensive equipment out there but, not always reliable. We will continue to pursue the best we can get based on our ability to pay.

A fund raiser is always an option and will take a little time to put together. Always open for ideas and any donations are always welcome.


